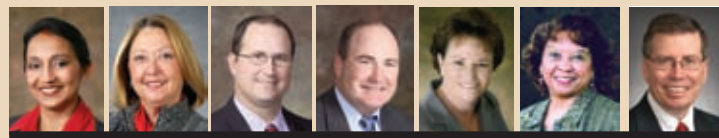

Fort Bend ISD named 2011 Texas District of Character and National Schools of Character Finalist

In February, the Texas Elementary Principals and Supervisors Association (TEPSA) selected Fort Bend ISD as a 2011 Texas District of Character. Fort Bend ISD is the only district in the state to receive this honor this year. TEPSA will honor Fort Bend ISD with a special recognition at the regular Board of Trustees meeting on April 11. The Character Education Partnership (CEP) has named Fort Bend ISD as one of only two school districts in the nation as a finalist in the 2011 National Schools of Character (NSOC) program. CEP will announce the names of the National Schools of Character in May 2011. Those designated National Schools of Character will serve as models and mentors to schools in their regions as they work to improve. "These are caring schools and we are thrilled to recognize their efforts and help them share their best practices with other educators," said Laura Maupin, NSOC Associate Director.

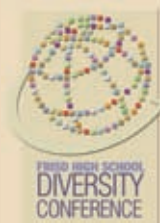

CHAMPS - provides for positive behavior support and trains teachers to improve student engagement in learning. "Implementing CHAMPS gave us a framework to improve discipline campus-wide at Oakland Elementary School.
